Henry Wadsworth Longfellow


I heard the bells on Christmas Day

#### From the West Manse

As I sit typing I can see a rainbow outside my window. I suspect it will have vanished by the time I finish this letter. This November has been a good month for rainbows, even if that is about the only 'good' in a wet and chilly spell which has included at least two named storms, lots of icy wind, and during which my hands have felt permanently cold.

By the time Encounter is published it will be December. You might even be reading this double edition in January, by which time we could have another named storm or two under our belts and 'permanently cold' may feel like the norm.

Still, at this moment, right now, I can see a rainbow.

Psychologically, rainbows serve some of the same purpose as Christmas lights in the middle of winter. They are a kind of visual promise that the storm, or the dark, is not endless.

For poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow (see Reflection) church bells, especially on Christmas Day, are an aural symbol of that promise: 'I heard the bells on Christmas Day their old familiar carols play, and wild and sweet the words repeat of peace on earth, good-will to men!'

The poem recognises the need for such symbols in a world where 'hate is strong and mocks the song'. But it ends with hope, "God is not dead, nor doth He sleep". Part of our rôle as a church is to hold onto the belief that God is not dead. In fact we argue the opposite, that Christ has defeated death itself and there will one day be real and lasting peace on earth. We hold that hope not just for ourselves, but for others. We hold it for all who struggle to see the light.

We do so in a world where it sometimes feels as if storms and darkness - physical and figurative - are increasing, and there are

fewer signs of light, of colour, of calm. Looking at the news online even has a new name, 'doom scrolling'.

Just as rainbows look particularly vivid and striking against a heavy grey background, and church bells are so clear and sonorous when they break the stillness, so should the faith and light, the peace and hope, the joy and love of Christmas be especially vivid in challenging times.

None of this makes Christmas easy. For many, it is a time of loneliness, painful absences, financial pressure and stressed relationships.

But it was dark in the stable too. As dark as Bethlehem will be this year, with the decision not to hang any Christmas lights.

I hope and pray that by the time Christmas rolls around there will be peace in Israel/Palestine. I hope and pray too that there will be peace in Ukraine. I pray that everywhere a peace as 'wild and sweet' as Longfellow describes will break out.

In the meantime I hold onto the light, the radiant colour, the ringing cry of Christ born into a world of darkness. The promise of peace made flesh and blood.

"The people walking in darkness have seen a great light ... For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulder. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace." (Isaiah 9: 2, 6)

Meanwhile, as I expected, the rainbow has gone. But, unexpectedly, the sky is blue. It may not last, but I am grateful for the reminder that the light always returns.

Christ's blessing be with you all in this season of darkness and light.

This has not been an easy decision, but with another deficit church budget projected for next year, and the hall impossible to heat economically or to keep maintained to an acceptable standard, we are having to be practical.

**VACANCY -** With Kenneth retiring as Church Officer/Centre Co-ordinator we are going to be recruiting a new staff member. With an increasingly tight financial budget due to rising costs, the session,



Acorn Centre Management Team and staff have been discussing how we might redistribute at least some of the work Kenneth has been doing. We are currently looking to start with a **part-time post of around twelve hours a week** to help cover the cleaning and centre assistant tasks, beginning with whichever duties we decide are most urgent.

Depending on how this works within our existing structures, we have the flexibility to use the remaining budgeted hours either to expand the existing post or to recruit another member of staff.

Meanwhile our volunteers, including an expanded duty officer or 'events' team will be picking up on some of the church officer duties, such as assisting at funerals, weddings, school assemblies and so forth.

More details of the staff post will be advertised as soon as we have them. In the meantime, if you know someone who might be interested in such a post, please let us know.
























#### **HOW TO REPLACE THE IRREPLACEABLE?**

Pastor's Note and Appeal

Dear sisters and brothers around the world.

Salaam and grace to you from the wounded Palestine. I hope this letter finds you all well, and that you are keeping us all in your thoughts and prayers. Since the 7th of October, the Holy Land has entered a period of grief, anger, anxiety, and fear. We as Christians never condone any violence. We pray for a just resolution in which human rights are granted to all of God's children.

To provide a small and honest update, since the 7th of October, myself and my congregation are living in what can only be described as ghettos. All Palestinian cities are separated from one another. All areas of the country have seen increased violence, and in Beit Jula we see the Israeli military enter every day.

Palestinians, even those holding permits, are not allowed to enter Israel for work or any other reason. Tourists and most international workers have fled the country. As the majority of Palestinians in Bethlehem require either entrance to Israel or the presence of tourists to make an income, our economy has all but flattened since October 7th. Though many see this new period as something with a concrete end once the violence stops, for us the lack of tourism and increased restrictions of movement will impact our local economy for years to come. Schools, in addition, have switched between online and in-person sessions, creating a very chaotic month of lessons for students. This will be a further destruction of an economy that was just starting to be rebuilt after the financial devastation we experienced during the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Church of Reformation in Beit Jala has done our best to provide emergency services to our community. We are using what little emergency funding we have to assist with crucial food, housing bills, and school fees for families directly impacted by loss of work.

Our Abraham's Tent program has remained open for students. We have prioritized making space for students to keep learning with support from the program even during times of strike or online learning. We saw the negative effect the COVID-19 pandemic had on our students' education and are doing everything we can to prevent this from happening again.

If it is not in your ability to give, I humbly request you keep us in your prayers.
