

#### From the West Manse

I've had a little bit of fun on Sundays over Lent, matching my jackets or cardigans with the particular colour I've been highlighting in our *'colours of Easter*' theme.



The association between colour and worship is, of course, a long one. In the Christian church year we have what we call liturgical seasons. Christmas and Easter, for example, are seasons, liturgically speaking, and not just festivals. Each season has an associated colour, with some variations among the different branches of the church. In some churches - including some of our own Church of Scotland congregations, the priest or minister will change some aspect of their attire - like a preaching scarf - to *'match'* the season.

I've never been in the habit of doing this, but I do get how this small change - year in, year out - can help shape the rhythm of worship and embed the pattern of the Christian year within congregations. It's also good to acknowledge that not everything we do in worship has to be led or guided by words. Feeding the senses can also help us to feel connected to God.

For centuries, churches have used their art and architecture to guide others to and through their faith. This was especially important during eras where literacy levels were low, but it still matters and is no doubt one of the reasons we still seek out separate or 'holy' spaces. We can and do worship anywhere but this doesn't diminish the focusing power of spaces designed to direct us to God and invoke emotions such as peace, awe, wonder, calm, joy, or humility. For all of these reasons I love the fact that for Easter Sunday we have a woven piece of art at the centre of our worship space. Our 'colours of Easter' work features strips of cloth donated and braided together by many members of our congregation. The whole has been designed and beautifully curated by Sharon Huxtable. Embedded in the woven braids are tiny embroidered words that have arisen throughout our worship over the last seven weeks. Words like *'love'* and *'peace'* and *'hope'*.

As well as the work itself I love what it represents - the many hands who have helped to make it; the many feelings and emotions we have worked through during Lent; the presence of God who weaves golden threads of grace through all our experiences.

As for my wardrobe on Easter Sunday, that's already chosen. My green dress and yellow jacket are not only the most daffodil-like choice I have (and what is Easter without daffodils?), yellow is also the closest I have to gold - the colour of Easter.

As the purple of Lent gives way to the gold of Easter - like the night giving way to the day, or death giving way to life - may you know the dawn of God's multihued grace and mercy this Resurrection Sunday and beyond.

## ACORN CENTRE

Spring has sprung and whilst it is often touted as a time for looking forward,

sometimes it is good to reflect before we take those next steps.

The 10<sup>th</sup> March 2024 was our 16<sup>th</sup> anniversary and we count our blessings each year for the support and encouragement that the Centre has enjoyed since its inception. We are still held up as a great example of a forward thinking congregation and an excellent use of the available space. What is more, it still feels *"new"* and

yet like its *"aye been"* at the same time. As the Acorn Centre hits another birthday, you may be wondering what we have spent funds raised for the **Acorn 15 initiative**.

Sadly the *"big stuff"* (a replacement dishwasher) was beyond our budget, so alternative methods of funding are being pursued there. Instead we are concentrating on the "small stuff". This has included new tea pots, saucepans, grill pans, spatulas, salad spinners, chopping boards, knives, chefs' uniforms, crockery, table numbers and teaspoons. We also





purchased an additional freezer so that we can make the most of donated produce, whether from the garden or elsewhere, or take advantage of special offers from our suppliers.

All these things are essential for keeping the centre operating to the same high standards that we have become known for.

#### **Spring Savers**

We have had a great reception to our Spring Saver offers, which have brought many new customers into the building. The **£2 brunch and £5 lunch offers** have proved most popular, the latter often resulting in a queue of customers at 11.30 waiting for lunch to start – particularly on a Friday (Fish Pie!). If you haven't already taken advantage of these offers, they will run until the end of April only, so don't miss out!



As we move into the warmer months, we will start incorporating more produce from our wonderful community garden team, and we'll say goodbye to winter staples like Cullen Broth, pies and puddings, in favour of a return to salad platters and strawberry tarts.

A big thank you to our volunteers who attended a series of training days recently. As well as covering all the essential health and safety stuff, we had some fun and lively debate around the best way to serve our customers and make the centre run as

#### Watch out! (Online safety message from Rhona)

Recently I preached on the passage in Mark 13 when Jesus advised his disciples to 'wait and watch'. Unfortunately I've been reminded recently about a different kind of watchfulness - namely watching that we and/or our loved ones aren't the victims of fraudulent activity.



Once again what looks like my church email address has been used by a scammer pretending to be me looking for assistance. This type of scam is called 'cloning' or 'spoofing' when a

fraudster creates an almost identical replica (or clone) of a legitimate email, text, social media account, or website. They then send an email from that account to try to trick the recipient into believing it comes from the legitimate email address/sender.

Usually the scam email will say something like 'I need a favour' or 'Could you help?' Clever scammers will do their best to try to sound like the sender with something like a friendly 'how are you?' Or 'haven't seen you in a while'. But they can often be spotted by their lack of personal detail or by use of a greeting or sign off which doesn't sound like the person they are pretending to be.

Their intention is to try to get a response from you which they will then use to persuade you to give them personal information and/or cash, or buy a gift card or something similar.

The scammers rely on the hope that at least a few people will respond before the person in whose name it has been sent finds

out and/or is able to let everyone in their contact list (which may number in the hundreds) know to ignore it.

If you receive such an email, the only thing you need to do is delete it, although you can also report it as spam to your internet provider.

Unfortunately there is no way to actually prevent this kind of fraud, all we can do is raise awareness.



So please note (and let anyone who doesn't get the magazine know) I will NEVER send you a generic 'can you help' or 'I need a favour' type email. If you get one, you can safely delete it. It will NOT be from me. Scammers can

be very clever and convincing, so don't feel bad if you have been tricked before. But please protect yourself and your loved ones either by immediately deleting any such message or, if you feel the need, by checking in personally with me via some other route than email.

Please also be on the alert for similar types of emails from others. The most important thing to remember is NEVER give out personal information, or respond to unsolicited requests for cash, assistance etc. Be wary, also, of clicking on links in unsolicited emails unless you are absolutely certain of the source.

A web site offering support gives the following general advice:

1. Always remember: if something seems too good to be true, it probably is.

2. Keep your personal information safe. Never give anyone your bank PIN or National Insurance number. And shred or tear up any letters that include your personal details — don't just throw them in the bin.

3. Keep safe online. Change your passwords regularly and make them as complex as you can remember. Install the latest antivirus protection on all your devices.

4. Be suspicious of 'cold callers' — anyone trying to sell you goods or services on your doorstep or over the phone where you haven't asked them to make contact. If you have any concerns, tell them politely but firmly you're not interested, and close the door or put the telephone down. Never get drawn into extended conversation, as fraudsters will use that ploy to try to persuade you to buy goods, often against your better judgement.
5. If you experience fraud, reporting the incident to Action Fraud may help the police catch the criminals. Visit the Action Fraud website or call 0300 123 2040 to log your case.




## **INVERURIE CHRISTIAN AID GROUP**
