From the West Manse



It was somewhat unexpected to find myself 'grounded' this Easter and unable to climb the Bass for our early service. The grounding was the result of me taking the term 'city break' far too literally and breaking my wrist while on holiday recently in Bristol and Bath.

How I managed to fall, minutes after arriving in Bath and about to enjoy a day of gentle exploring and relaxation, is a bit of a mystery. Maybe that's why, when I took the ground level early service instead of making the climb up the Bass, my thoughts turned to the mystery of the resurrection and Luke's determination to '*investigate everything from the beginning*'.

I wondered how his investigative efforts would fare against the '*Ten Commandments of Detective Fiction*' created by early 20th century writer Ronald Knox. Knox was clearly irritated by the detective cliches of his time and made such rules as '*No more than one secret room or passage allowed*', or '*Twin brothers, and doubles generally, must not appear unless we have been duly prepared for them*'.

I could imagine Luke similarly checking the witnesses' accounts for holes. 'Could Jesus' body have been smuggled out in secret? Did anyone **really** see Jesus after his death, or did Jesus have a double?'

Luke's ultimate conclusion, however, broke one of Knox's core commandments - which was to rule out any supernatural or preternatural explanation. Knox insisted that divine interference had no place in a fictional whodunnit.

But here's the twist - Knox was also a Catholic priest. It would appear, that for Knox divine mystery belonged in the realm of reality, not fiction.

It seems that Luke agreed. His 'orderly account' became what we know as the gospel of Luke.

Many people make the mistake of thinking that faith is about dogmatic certainty - like a detective novel that neatly wraps up all the loose ends for us and gives us clear human agents and answers.

But I think more often faith involves a tolerance for a bit of mystery. The mystery of the resurrection. The mystery of Christ's presence in communion which we have recently celebrated together. The mystery of the Spirit's empowering at Pentecost, which lies around the corner for us in the church calendar. The mystery of how the accounts of one man's life and death could shape the course of history for over 2000 years and still change people's lives now.

Our desire for certainty is understandable. This month we mark 80 years since VE Day. At a time when war is once again a reality in Europe, and the world order feels shaky, the idea that there are clear, unambiguous answers to all the questions that trouble us is appealing.

This last month also brought us the death of Pope Francis, a man billions of people - both Catholics and non-Catholics - looked to for inspiration and reassurance. In Pope Francis' case this was due not only to his role, but also to his personal qualities.

Perhaps my favourite tribute to him comes from singer Bob Dylan
“Pope Francis was a voice of mercy in a time of noise. He walked with humility, spoke with fire and dared to love the unloved. He reminded the world that compassion isn’t weakness, and faith doesn’t have to shout to be heard. May he rest in the eternal peace he so often preached.”

Pope Francis once admitted he sometimes fell asleep while praying. But he contentedly compared this to a child falling asleep in his Father’s arms. In the end that was the only certainty he needed.

If you like everything to be smooth sailing and predictable, a bit of mystery can trip you up. But if all you need is the certainty that we are loved and a commitment to share that love with others, then some divine mystery can also intrigue and inspire and lead us to interesting places - hopefully without the need for a detour to A&E!

It’s going to be on **Sunday July 27th** at Hillhead of Harlaw so please put it in your diary. More information will follow in next month’s magazine.




THE GUILD

CHRISTIAN AID – LOCAL CONNECTIONS AND GLOBAL OUTREACH

This year Christian Aid is celebrating its 80th anniversary. Originally set up by British and Irish Churches in order to help refugees in the aftermath of the Second World War, the organisation works with people of all faiths and none to alleviate poverty and turn hope into action.


Many of you will know of Inverurie's particular connection to the origins of Christian Aid through the significant role played by **Douglas Lister** (1920-2010), who served as minister of St Andrew's Parish Church between 1957 and 1967 and later retired to Inverurie in 1987.



When he was garrison chaplain attached to the Royal Scots Greys in Lüneburg in Northern Germany in 1947, he was approached one day in the middle of the worst winter of the century by a German officer, with a plea for help for 80,000 nearby refugees, who were struggling in the freezing conditions, with little or nothing to eat. Douglas Lister immediately asked High Command for permission to help these people.

His request was refused, on the grounds that this would be fraternisation with the enemy. Encouraged by his friend, Captain John Althorp (later Earl Spencer), Douglas Lister appealed against the decision, citing his obligation as chaplain to serve people regardless of race, colour or religion. He won the appeal, and a letter was sent out all over Scotland entitled "*Germany calling – an appeal for your help*".

In his booklet, *“The Lüneburg Story”*, Douglas Lister wrote that he was overwhelmed by the generosity of the people of Scotland. In recognition of his work in Lüneburg, the people of the town named a street after him, and held a civic reception in his honour in 1996.



A special service to celebrate Douglas Lister’s contribution to the origins of Christian Aid will be held in St Andrew’s Church on **Tuesday, 13th May at 7 pm.** The Rev Carl Irvine, Charlie Meiklejohn and Christian Aid Global Thematic advisor for Health and Gender, Temwa Kasakula will lead the service.

Other British and Irish churches had been working across Europe to help those who had lost everything, under the banner of *“Christian Reconstruction in Europe”*, later renamed the *“Inter-Church Aid and Refugee Service”*, which in 1964 became *“Christian Aid”*. Refugees were still the main focus of their work, but Christian Aid began working with poor communities around the world.

Just as Christian Aid supported, equipped and enabled partner churches in mainland Europe to provide what people needed as a result of war 80 years ago, today they are doing the same. Sadly the need is even greater, particularly with the reduction



in governments’ funding for foreign aid. Through the generosity of donors to Christian Aid, the organisation has been able to provide assistance and support to people who are surviving

crises and rebuilding their lives, whether in South Sudan, Gaza, or Ukraine. In the last year Christian Aid has funded more than 400 projects and taken humanitarian aid to 3.2 million people. While global neighbours experience conflict, poverty and injustice, the efforts of Christian Aid will not stop.

This year, Christian Aid Week highlights the stories of **indigenous farmers in Guatemala**, who are bearing the full force of climate change. Christian Aid week is an important seven-day period which highlights the need to support those to support families who are working hard to protect their children from hunger and malnutrition.



RECENTLY RESTOCKED IN UBUNTU



Divine Chocolate was launched in 1998 and is a global social enterprise driven by the aim of helping to end exploitation in the cocoa industry and thereby create a world where farmers thrive and prosper. Their business model reflects the belief that producers should earn a share of the profits they help to create, and this is why Kuapa Kokoo Farmers' Union, a co-operative of over 100,000 cocoa farmers in Ghana, co-own *Divine* Chocolate. Most Ghanaian cocoa is grown on small family farms, typically of between 2-3 hectares. It is usually intercropped with other plants and trees, such as plantains, maize and spices. These not only provide shade while the cocoa trees are growing, but they can also provide up to 65% of the family's own food supply as well as additional income.



Through their relationships with cocoa growers in Ghana, *Divine* can trace the cocoa in any bar of chocolate back to the co-operative from which it originated. This 'bean-to-bar' approach demonstrates their commitment to social and economic issues and ensures excellence in quality control. All the cocoa, sugar and vanilla used to make *Divine* chocolate is certified Fairtrade. *Divine* also endeavours to source other ingredients from Fairtrade suppliers, such as almonds from Pakistan, mangos from Burkina Faso, and coconut from Sri Lanka. In addition to paying farmers their share of profits and the Fairtrade Premium, *Divine* also invests in farmer projects geared particularly towards gender equality, securing land rights and improving farming techniques.
