"I've become very Scottish over the years".

This is a phrase I have found myself using from time to time generally when talking about the weather. Being *"very Scottish"* in this instance means I start complaining about the heat the moment the temperature hits the early 20s. Of course I know many Scots love the heat and will travel thousands of miles to get to it if necessary. But it's fair to say that our climate predisposes us to be used to cooler and milder temperatures regardless of how we feel about them.

In any case, this particular Canadian Scot or Scottish Canadian or whatever I am these days, breathed in the cool Glasgow air with relief after returning in July from bereavement leave in a very humid and wildfire smokeplagued Canada. August's annual leave has been spent in distinctly non-tropical regions like Inverness and Ayrshire.

It's been an odd summer for me, due to personal circumstances. In many ways I have been fortunate. After the loss of my mum, I have had the chance to kind of ground myself in family and friends - spending a bit of time with my sisters in Canada, a few weeks back at the West, and then time with family here in Scotland and visiting old friends. I even made it last Sunday to worship at my old church at Fullarton in Irvine - where half the congregation is familiar to me and half is brand new!

It's all reminded me that time doesn't stand still and that over time our identity can shift and change. Over the summer I've revisited, reminisced, or reaffirmed what it has meant to be a daughter, a sister, a traveller, a single mother, a grandmother, a Canadian, a Scot, a ministry student, a friend. You might be relieved to hear that these wanderings across my personal and geographical timelines have left me still quite sure that I have ended up where I am supposed to be in Inverurie, and in ministry at and with the West Church. At the same time, it has been good and healthy to step outside my accustomed role for a while, get some rest, and widen my perspective.

Our work and our mission may be for the most part largely local but we are part of much wider ecosystems - in church, in society, in the world. Many of those ecosystems are currently very fragile and need us to find ways of working together to ensure a healthy future for all. The world, like the climate, is changing and we too have to adapt and change so that the love of Christ may still be known and recognised across today's generations.

And so a new autumn season begins once more. I've come home to a new orange bin, a groaning email inbox and a rapidly filling diary. I'll be running to catch up with all that you wonderful people at the West and our various partners have been setting in motion for September. Please do check the inside of the magazine and the diary page for details of what's on.

As the Church of Scotland's **Season of Creation** begins, let's dig deep into our own creative resources so that, whatever our individual shifts in identity may be, we can collectively continue to be a centre for love and growth and community and faith - this year and in the years to come.

Acorn Centre Update



Orn It has been another successful summer at the Centre Acorn Centre, with sales remaining strong throughout and avoiding the usual quieter spell we normally see during the School Holidays. A massive thanks to those that have supported us, either as volunteers or as customers over the summer and helped us through a challenging staffing period.

There has been another bumper crop of produce from the Community Kitchen Garden and we have been largely selfsufficient for salad vegetables this year. This is quite an achievement this year given the difficult growing conditions that a dry May and June followed by a soggy July and August afforded us. As we enter harvest season, a reminder that we are more than happy to take any excess produce donations from your own gardens and orchards for us to turn into soups, puddings, jams and chutneys.

Moving into Autumn there is a lot going on at the Centre. Monday 18th September and Staff 'Thank you' Evening back for the first time post pandemic. There will be a slightly different format to previous years with a full meal and entertainment. It's a great opportunity for our volunteers to get together and to thank them for their hard work, selflessness, and the donations to so many local groups and charities who benefit from the Small Grants **Scheme**, which is funded entirely by gratuities from our grateful customers. Friday 6th October sees a return of our ever popular fundraising **pop-up Bistro**, this time featuring an Italian theme. UBUNTU NEWS

Good news for Fair Trade producers - new research released in June by *GlobeScan* showed that consumers are staying loyal to Fairtrade. Despite the

increased cost of living, 55 percent of shoppers surveyed in 12 countries said they were willing to pay more for a Fairtrade product. **Sandra Uwera,** Global CEO of Fairtrade International, said '*It is encouraging that shoppers are staying committed to sustainability values even during hard times, to support farmers and workers getting a fair income*'.

What's New in Ubuntu

Joining the hand-carved wooden robins and blackbirds are tawny owls, made in Bali - another in the range of British birds hand carved and painted using sustainable albesia wood. The owl is sitting on a wooden trunk made of waste gamal wood which tolerates being cut back. Gamal wood is used to provide shade for plantation crops such as coffee, and for fencing, fodder, firewood etc.

The ever-popular Tree of Life symbol is now available in carved mango wood letter racks and photo frames, Fair Trade and ethically produced. Mango wood is a fast-growing wood and therefore a sustainable material. It takes approximately 7 to 10 years to grow, which is much less than comparable hard woods.

For cat lovers, do check out the hand-painted ceramic cat salt and pepper pots. Black and white kitties with a retro 60s vibe.

There are new additions to the Suncatcher, Finger Puppet and Jute Bags range –

- **Suncatchers** Clouds, Rainbow and Sun (a typical Scottish summer day) and Three Rainbow Hearts (with a 3D effect)
- Finger Puppets (hand knitted in Peru) Boa Constrictor, Bat, and Giraffe
- Jute Bags Brightly Coloured Mushrooms, Bees and Sunflower, and Woodland Animals in the Moonlight.

Hand Carved Olive Wood Dove Pendants. Made in Bethlehem by a guaranteed World Fair Trade Organization member whose aim is to preserve the local handicraft traditions, and benefit future generations of Palestinians. They strive to alleviate local poverty and unemployment. Their olive wood carving technique was first developed because of the local availability of olive wood and the demand by pilgrims for religious icons.

And last but not least a quirky hen-shaped storage basket made from recycled wire by Fair Trade artisans in India - what would you store in it?


























SEASON OF CREATION

The 'Season of Creation' is a global and ecumenical movement in Christian churches. It's a chance to celebrate what it means to be Church against the real, urgent, and increasing



threat of climate and other environmental crises, and to rediscover the meaning of a distinctive human calling of justice, care, guidance and partnership with - as well as dependence on - fellow creatures with whom we share so much.

There's never been a more compelling reason for prayer; for the Christian claim on hope beyond hope; and the joy and deepening of faith we've seen amongst the most committed congregations in the **Eco-Congregation** Scotland movement, sharing stories and encouraging each other, especially as we gather on Sunday, offering worship and receiving nourishment from our Creator.

This year Church of Scotland members are being invited to step out in support of climate justice and join others in Scotland and around the world on a virtual journey from Glasgow to Egypt. Taking place in the run-up to **United Nations Climate Change Conference COP27, Walk2COP27** is based on the journey from COP26 host city Glasgow to this year's venue Sharm El-Sheikh on the Red Sea.

Over the 45 days of Walk2COP27, a dozen countries between Scotland and Egypt will host hybrid or virtual **"Townhall"** meetings to showcase the impact of climate change and the solutions that are being deployed in each nation, beginning with an event in Glasgow on **Thursday 22 September.**
