From the West Manse

I've been thinking quite a lot about clarity lately.

In part this has been brought on by the work which Alan Harrow, Chris Gardner, and I, alongside our web designer Daniel McPherson, have been doing over the last few months to create a new church website which we hope will be clear, consistent, warm and welcoming.

The website is now live at the usual address and we are delighted with the work Daniel has done for us. Chances are, you are currently reading this letter in the magazine's online version on the site right now!

Among his many sterling qualities, Daniel has been very patient when we have asked for various tweaks and changes as the website settles in. One of these was an unfortunate 'mea culpa' on my part. Having used a quote in a recent Sunday service, which I believed was from the new pope, I referred to part of the same quote in the draft of my first blog on the website. Only, not long after sending it to Daniel, I discovered there was no reliable evidence that Pope Leo had indeed used those exact words.

I am usually quite careful about the quotes I use. I've had too much academic training not to check sources and get attributions right. But this time I failed. My second draft of the blog turned into a confession, a few thoughts about the confusion and murkiness that sharing of online information can create, and a promise that it would always clearly be me writing the blog not an AI bot!

Confusion and clarity share the stage in the festival of Pentecost, which this year is in June.

Of course your average person on the street, and even many church-goers, don't pay a lot of attention to Pentecost. If they do, they are apt to find what they hear rather confusing. A sound like a great wind? Something that seemed like tongues of flames? And then suddenly Galilean apostles speaking in multiple languages they couldn't possibly have known but which were each understood by someone listening?

I mean what is all that about? It sounds a recipe for mass confusion!

There's a humorous scene in one of Adrian Plass's *Sacred Diary* books about church life, in which the fictional version of himself is caught up in a Pentecost service which descends into chaos. If I remember correctly, a smoke machine and flaming gas canisters were involved.

Plass gently and affectionately pokes fun at the church's well-meaning, but ultimately doomed attempt to re-create what must have been an incredibly dramatic, and for some a very confusing, moment in the church's history.

But the purpose of Pentecost was not chaos or confusion but clarity and connection. The spirit arrived with the ability to connect people through the power of language. Amidst the drama, the outcome was that everyone present heard the apostles declaring the wonders of God in their own languages.

The important thing was not how it happened, but that it happened at all.

This Pentecost we will be once more having a shared IDCT Pentecost service in the town. Unlike last year, it will be a Sunday evening service rather than an alternative to our various morning services. This is to allow people both to worship in their usual ways in the morning, and to join us in the evening in the hall of the

Church of the Immaculate Conception, North Street for something that might feel both familiar and different as it combines our varying traditions.

I feel entirely confident in saying that nobody at IDCT has purchased either a smoke machine or any gas canisters and I don't expect the service to feel remotely chaotic. But it can be a little unsettling for some to step outside their usual patterns of worship.

But what is clear to me, in these divisive times, is that it is a good thing that we live in a town where Christians of a whole range of denominations are willing to put aside their differences or preferences to worship together.

And what is also clear to me is that anything which connects us and encourages us to listen and pay attention to one another and to the Spirit is good.

Most of all, what is clear to me, is that the Spirit has many ways - some dramatic, some quiet - of helping us to hear about and understand the wonders of God.

So spare a moment if you can, wherever you find yourself this Pentecost, to breathe in some of that spirit-enabled wonder. And may it fill you to the brim with the clear awareness and living presence of the love of God.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND

The 2025 General Assembly took place from Saturday, **17 May to Thursday, 22 May 2025**, at the Assembly Hall on the Mound, Edinburgh. Rt Rev Rosie Frew reflected on this having been a

challenging and inspiring Assembly. A few of the discussions are summarised below.

'We must be present, prophetic and purposeful' -

The convener of the Public Life and Social Justice Programme

Group, set out a call for commissioners and congregations to consider how all parts of the Church of Scotland can pray and work for peace, climate action and against the entrenchment of poverty in Scotland and across the world.



Truth in the public square - The General Assembly heard from **Marjorie Clark**, an elder from Perth St Matthew's, who said, "Increasingly we hear of climate change deniers, those casting doubts about vaccine safety, the blaming of Muslims and asylum seekers following the Southport attacks." She cited these as examples of where truth is challenged and dangerous opinions are presented as fact, fuelling further division and fear only encouraging further division and fear. The Assembly agreed a motion which encouraged the Church to uphold truth in the public square and to challenge misinformation.

Fossil Fuels --In a landmark decision, the General Assembly agreed to endorse the global initiative calling for a Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty. The Church of Scotland has, at previous General Assemblies, made commitments to respond to climate change and promote climate justice.

Scotland Demands Better - The Kirk gave its backing to a major Anti-Poverty march planned for **25 October** in Edinburgh.

The Church of Scotland heard an invitation to renew its work in the words contained in Micah 6:8, "And what does the Lord require of you? To act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with our God".

For those who don't know my story, I have suffered with depression for over 15 years, and in 2022 I hit rock bottom and attempted to take my own life. There's still so much to do to break the stigma around mental health, men's mental health and the mental health of farmers. I'm raising money for RSABI for the great work they do for everyone in Scottish agriculture whether that be practical, financial or emotional support.

The supplier is a well-established maker of cotton scarves based in New Delhi, and they abide with all local and national




government regulations on workplace practices and pay above the minimum wage. There is no child labour or discrimination of any kind, and men and women earn the same rates for the same work.



LIFE AND WORK UPDATE

Sadly, the Church of Scotland can no longer afford to print its **146-year-old** magazine, Life and Work. The Kirk's General Assembly in Edinburgh was told that publication of the monthly magazine would end later this year. This is because of falling readership and a "growing financial deficit".



Lynne McNeil, who has edited Life and Work for 23 years, said many print

publications were struggling due to a market of "diminishing returns". She said the magazine's core audience was among the 68,160 worshippers on average who attended church on Sundays. Sales of the magazine have also been affected by church closures. Proposals are expected to be put to next year's assembly about a new publication.
